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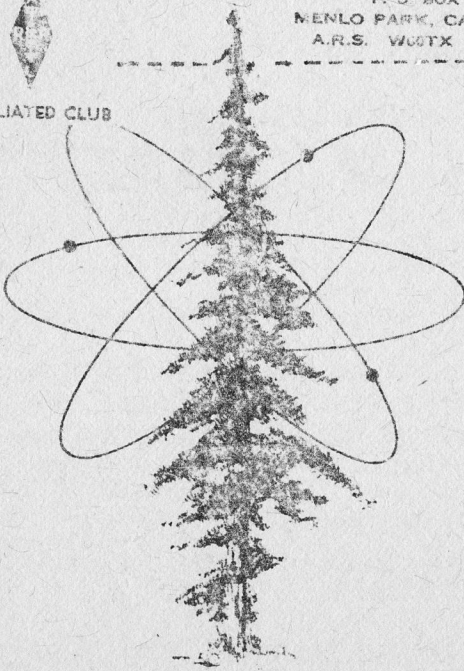

The station is owned and operated by the Far East Broadcasting Company. It beams programs of educational, cultural and christian content to all Latin American Nations. The broadcasts are made daily starting at 3:30PM PST on the assigned frequency of 15,280Mhz. Take a listen.

All those wishing to participate in the Field Trip should meet on the parking lot of the Marine World, on Marine World Parkway just off Bayshore Freeway at the northern edge of Redwood City. Assembly time is before 7:30PM. At that time the group will proceed in caravan to the Radio Station. There we will assemble in the conference room for a brief general meeting and description of the Station functions. Arrangements for the tour of the Station were made through Mr. Jack Brooks.

Anyone missing the caravan may proceed on Marineworld Parkway to Bridge Parkway, turn left and proceed to Peninsula Parkway, turn left and go to Shell Parkway, continue until you see a sign identifying KGEI and KNBR - proceed to the building of KGEI. 4th OF JULY PARADE - The annual Redwood City's Fourth of July parade is a big event in and on the Peninsula. The Peninsula Celebrations Association is the sponsor and the Redwood City Civil Defense and Disaster Communications Net handles the necessary details of assembling and the resolution of emergencies which may occur during the parade. It provides the Base Control Station, W6WWJ, and eight portable stations each with operator and messenger. The communications group assembles at Arguello and Whipple Streets in Redwood City at 8:30AM, station locations are assigned and communications are established. The parade usually lasts about an hour.

Fred showed several slides of the Field Day operation of AMPEX at Huddart Park in 1970. Several were really beautiful while others had very nice detail about the various installations by that Club.

Visitor Millard Edgerton, WA6VZZ was introduced.

Andy and Wayne had assembled a very impressive array of various ATV instruments and devices. They proceeded to demonstrate their operability and explain their various functions. By block diagram and detailed circuitry they explained the function of each "block" and mentioned some of the various "gremlins" encountered. A VERY INTERESTING EVENING!!!

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING, ⁷Trailer SRI, 6 June 1973:

Eight members present. Meeting called to order at 7:30 P.M..
Financial report was given.

Fred Canham, K6TV, outlined the very successful participation of the Club in 2 "Exploratoriums" held at the Eastbrook and Portola Schools in Los Altos. Fred, Jerry Starkey, WA6LIJ and Ed Fairbanks, W6AIN, assisted others in setting up an amateur station at each school. Contacts were made with various other hams and the children were allowed to talk over the air. About 90 to 100 children were thus introduced to the world of Ham Radio. Jerry Holter of the Foot-hill Club and Larry Reed of San Carlos also participated.

Hal Moore, W6DEF, announced that Ralph Trout, WA6EGH and his wife Rachel, WA6EQA, had volunteered to operate and maintain the Red Cross Station W6OTR. The Board voted an expression of gratitude to the Trouts for their assistance.

Jerry Starkey, WA6LIJ, broached the subject of the lattice tower available according to Hal Moore. Some discussion - no decision.

Andy Korsak, VE3FZK, brought up the subject of the next meeting program. Bob Baum, W6BFH, mentioned that he would be unable to assist in the tour of the Weather Station at Redwood City on 6 July. Andy suggested a trip to KGEI in lieu of the weather station. All agreed.

In view of past experiences with the San Carlos Club and their failure to produce promised actions the Board agreed that Andy Korsak will discuss with them the possibility of discontinuing the past arrangement whereby PAARA depended upon them to arrange for meetings, produce a page for our PAARAGRAPHS and other functions.

Andy announced that San Carlos has 100 operators available for Field Day! Some skepticism expressed!

After much discussion there was no agreement by the Board members regarding these suggestions. The problem was reassigned to the Awards Committee for further study.

Hal Moore asks what time the Teams should assemble on Friday for station preparation. The Board instructed that this was a decision for each Team Captain.

Lee Zalaznik, WB6BJB, announced his resignation as editor of PAARAGRAPHS. He suggested that the President determine future publication policy. The Board passed a resolution of thanks to Lee for his excellent work over the past year.

There was much discussion of alternatives to assure the continuation of PAARAGRAPHS as the Club organ. Vance Wardlow W6FLE, suggested it be coordinated with the EMARC Foothill College paper. This would provide a responsible base from which the paper could be correlated and published. Some Board members felt very sure this would not be feasible.

Meeting adjourned at 10PM.

They, on their own, set up a 60 foot mast with a 20 foot cross bar on which they mounted a 40 meter Quad! Using guidance from QST the result was a very efficient beam. Topping it all, 20 feet above the mast they mounted an american flag - it could be seen for many miles around the valley. CONGRATULATIONS ! ! ! They then proceeded to rack up a score of 97 contacts! !

The #2 Phone team captained by Lee Zalaznik started out somewhat disorganized. However with a little assist here and there Lees team got the antennas up, the tent erected and the sets installed. Once in operation the expertise of this team began to show results. By judicious spelling of the watches by each they racked up a score of 297 contacts.

TECHNICAL TOPICS de Andy Korsak VE3FZK/W4

Typing this article is the last thing I have to do before getting on the way to British Columbia (VE7 land) — the camper is all outfitted, the kids are bugging me to get going already, and I just have to fulfill my responsibilities to my glorious radio club!

I will be mobile on 20, 40, and 80 and made skeds with Bob W6BFH Vance W6FLE and Ed W6AIN starting out on 14,275 at 0300z and if no good then at or near 7255 abt 0310 and if that's no good then on 3952 at abt 0320Z, and if that's no good, I'll give up (no more bands in my NCX-3). My vacation is from June 16 till July 1.

I just slapped together another intercom system in my camper. The previous system consisted of a 3-watt Callectro a.f. amp wired thru a switching system to a couple of cheap speakers, and I never could get rid of the feedback so last year on my mobile trip across the USA I copped out and bought a pair of Realistic walkie-talkies. These worked fine till the kids got hold of them and busted off half the antenna on each one. Have you ever seen a kid hold a walkie talkie that didn't have the antenna busted off? If you did, I'll eat my words! Anyway, this time I'm falling back to the experience of trusty old "Maw Bell". I hooked up an ordinary telephone in the camper and a telephone operator type headset in the cab, so the driver doesn't have to take hands off the wheel and can converse two ways. The only time the driver has to do anything is to push a normally off microswitch I pulled out of the club kitty and wired in series with the two sets, when wanting to ring the bell of the phone in the camper so as to keep down battery drain and have the camper unit hung up unless talking. Telephones don't work well with less than 24 volts, so I am using an old telephone battery in series with the car battery. So far it works fine, but I haven't tried it under high noise driving conditions.

Converting 11 Antennas for Two Antennas

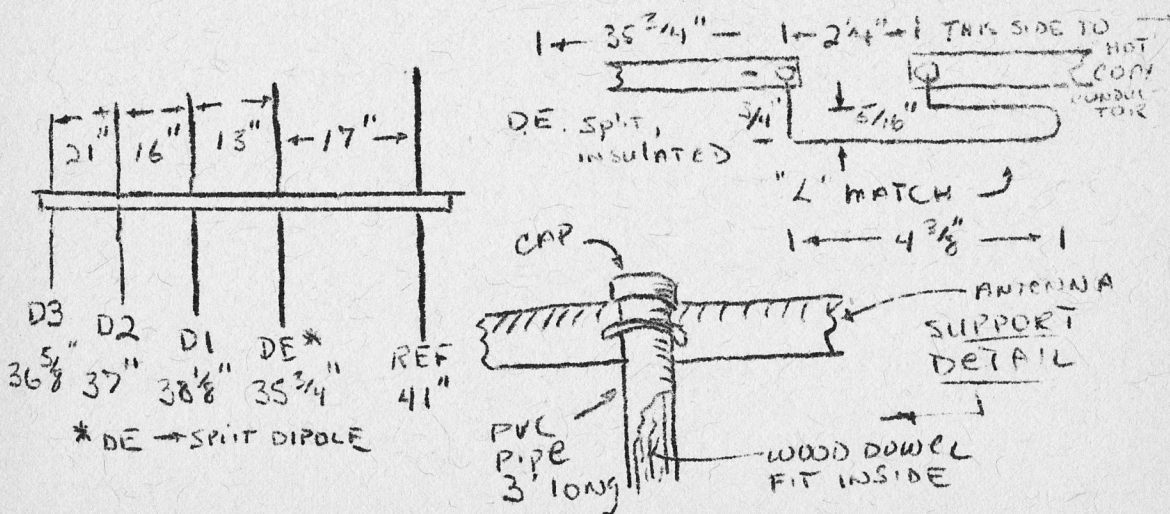
About everyone has an old all-aluminum antenna line around — the one you get for the 10-15 ft. (especially 10, 20 or 30 ft. long). So you have

on most is about 6 feet, and the three low-band elements on the typical "three by three" low- and high-band antenna can be cut down to make three longest elements for the two-meter Yagi. Save the "delta" arms of the original array -- they are long enough for the remaining two directors. Also the insulating block is good for the driven element -- it must be a split dipole with "L" match.

The antenna should be vertically polarized so mount all elements using the original hardware and drilling out rivets, along a plane perpendicular to the mounting "U" clamp. Because of the vertical orientation, you must use an insulating support for about the first three feet, after which conventional TV mast can be used. This is best done by good old PVC pipe, capped at the top and stuffed (for greater stiffness) with a dowel rod fitted to the inside diameter of the pipe.

The matching is accomplished by W4KAB's idea given in the last page of the VHF manual -- the direct coax-fed "L" match. Dimensions are given below, and all that is necessary for a good match is a decent SWR bridge.

The Times has been advised many times of the special status of "amateur radio operators". Several local amateurs have gone to great length to advise the Times that radio amateur radio operators are very conscious of their responsibilities to the public, go to great lengths to avoid any interference such as described in the article and have set up special committees to investigate any such problems. Also the Times has been advised many times that Citizen Band operators are not Amateur Radio Operators, they continue to create problems on the air waves, are practically unregulated and are known throughout the United States for their disregard of the laws and regulations for the protection of the public.

It is suggested that all members and subscribers write a letter to the Times objecting to the misrepresentation of the Ham fraternity in their article.

The Times did give us a nice writeup on Field Day in their June 22 issue also on page 3. We do appreciate this information being made available to the public which is the final beneficiary of our Field Day activities.

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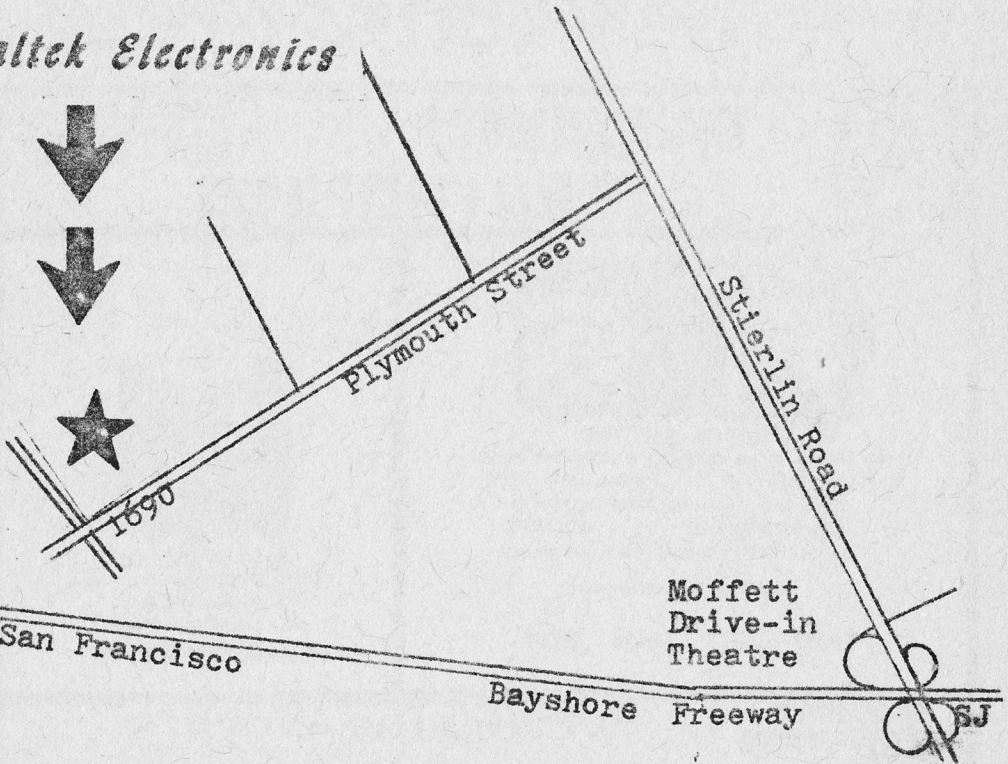
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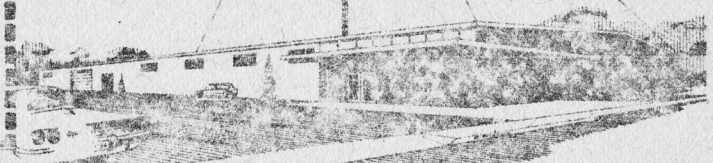
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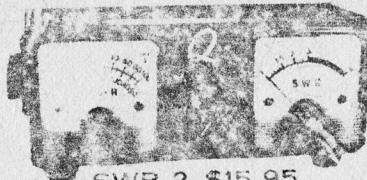


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
