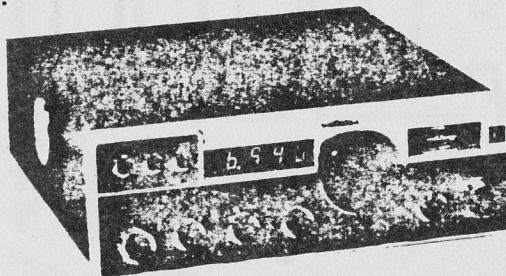

To reach AMPEX from BAYSHORE or EL CAMINO: Take WOODSIDE ROAD (State Rt. 84) to BAY ROAD (two blocks east of BAYSHORE) turn south four blocks to AMPEX parking lot. Cafeteria is just south of Building No. 1.

HERE ARE THE RULES

1. Doors open at 9:00 a.m., AUCTION AND FLEA MARKET start at 10:00 a.m., and continue until 3:30 p.m.
2. Register at desk, obtain your AUCTION LOT NUMBERS OR FLEA MARKET TABLE. Then bring your gear into the Cafeteria. There will be monitors and hand trucks to help move your gear or equipment.

PLEASE STAY OFF THE GRASS

3. Buyers must register for bidding during the AUCTION.
4. AUCTION lot numbers will be issued in sequence of registration and will be auctioned in that order.
5. CHARGES: 10% of sale price of auctioned items will be retained by PAARA. If you buy back your own equipment, this fee also applies. Flea Market tables are \$3.50 each.
6. LIMITS: Auction material will be limited to 5 lots per person the first time around. If time permits, additional material may be put up for auction.
7. IDENTIFICATION: In addition to his lot number, owner should include information on the material to be sold.
 - a) Description of article, frequency range, power required, etc.
 - b) Condition of item.
 - a) operating
 - b) not known
 - c) needs repair
8. DONATIONS will be welcomed by PAARA. Such material will be sold to help defray club expenses. ALL SUCH MATERIAL IS GREATLY APPRECIATED.
9. DURING THE AUCTION buyers must show their registration number to record their purchases.
10. PAYING AND RECEIVING: Buyers and sellers will make payment and collect money due at the TREASURER'S DESK. Buyers are urged to settle promptly after each purchase.

INTERNATIONAL CORNER -- In September, 1979, representatives of 154 International Telecommunications Union (ITU) member nations will meet in Geneva to re-evaluate and negotiate allocations of various services to different parts of the RF spectrum on a world-wide basis. These World Administrative Radio Conferences (WARC) take place every 20 years. Agreements as to which service shall occupy what segments of the RF spectrum are decided by vote, each country having one vote. It is expected that Amateur Radio, because of its many allocations in the HF, VHF, UHF and microwave segments, will be the subject of much debate since many other services will be arguing their need for extended spectrum coverage.

Front-row representatives for each country are professional diplomats; backing them are technical and legal advisors from the communications administrations of their governments. Backing these official telecommunications agencies will be representatives of various special interest non-governmental organizations, each officially recognized by its own country's government as spokesman for specific users of the RF spectrum. In the U. S. delegation, ARRL will represent Amateur Radio. League officials at WARC-79 will not be permitted to negotiate with opposite members from other countries but will function as observers and advisors to the U. S. negotiators. This same organization of delegates and observer/advisors applies to all ITU members; heads of memberstates authorize the final membership of each delegation. President Carter signs the order establishing the membership of the U. S. representation.

Amateur Radio will be represented by selected members of the International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) which has 105 member societies. The IARU team advisors are authorized to attend all meetings of the seven primary ITU committees and 45 sub-committees. IARU reps will get to know delegates (about 2000), their positions and their countries attitude towards Ham radio, and will seek to persuade delegates of the advantages to their countries of protecting, expanding, and, in some cases, creating the Amateur Service as a matter of national policy.

The use of HF bands by the Amateur Service is expected to be the most hotly disputed issue of WARC. At this time the U. S. position set forth by the FCC provides for the exclusive world-wide Amateur use of the following HF bands:

1.7 - 2.0 MHz	10.1 - 10.6MHz	21 - 21.5
3.5 - 4.0 MHz (3 .9 in Europe)	14.0 - 14.5MHz	24 - 24.5
6.8 - 7.3 MHz	18.1 - 18.6MHz	28 - 29.7

plus significant increases of VHF, UHF and microwave assignments.

A plea for good operating practices and self-policing was made to strengthen position of Amateur Radio in the eyes of the ITU; to spread Amateur Radio at home and abroad, the latter by supporting the spread of low-cost equipment such as that developed by ARRL.

The presentation was made by ARRL's Bruce Johnson, attended by about 100 local Amateurs from the Bay Area and reported by Steve, K6FS.

CORRESPONDENCE CORNER -- Hal, W6DEF, reports that Gerry, WA6OPA and his XYL, looking for a place to eat in Auburn, happened along to find Hal sweeping the doorway of 60° High Street. He didn't say whether anyone was fed but did remark about the fine OSO they had. Hal keeps busy but finds time to enter traffic in the N.C. Traffic Net and working into WR6ADI and WR6AKL.

OVERHEARD CORNER -- The KGO listener who suffered a minor breakdown was released after a few weeks of therapy. He complained that, because of his location, he could get KGO only at night. A friend, who happened to be a Ham, suggested he put the old bed spring in the garage up in the oak tree and use it as an antenna. 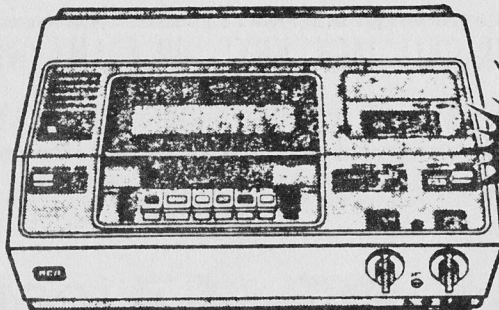

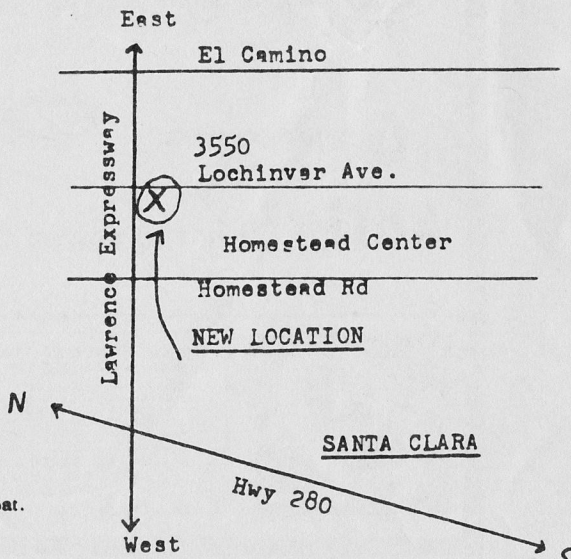

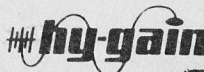
