EQUIPMENT CORNER: Bob Thompson, K6SSJ, recently prepared a analysis of four highly successful commercial transceivers, the Drake TR-7, DR-7, ICOM IC-701, YAESU FT 901M and the Kenwood TS-820S. His analysis is that of a ham and reads nicely. With his permission they will be included in the next issues of PAARagraphs for your analysis:

KENWOOD TS 820S:- What can one say about the TS 820 that has not already been said. It is a super rig. It's possibly the most popular rig in use on the amateur bands today. If you aren't familiar with it those advertising guys are going to be very upset with you. This rig is as popular on the ham bands as VW Bugs and Rabbits (don't forget Honda too) on the Freeways. It's great on CW and equally good on Phone. IF shift helps to eliminate loads of QRM on either SSB or CW. The built in features are most helpful. The Speech Compressor gives it a good bit of punch on Phone and helps in the pileups for the elusive ones.

The SM-220 Station Monitor looks like a super desirable accessory for use with this rig. A scope monitor and panadapter built into one unit. The R-820 also appears to be a super receiver and it can be used as an external VFO for this popular rig. I haven't had the opportunity to check out their SP-820 speaker with built in Audio

Filters but reports are that it works very satisfactorily.

The rig itself is one of the least expensive of the late transceivers available today. It's loaded with nice features, it's in wide use in the U. S. and elsewhere. A DC to DC converter option is available so as to make it convenient to work from a car battery but this feature is not included as a built in. For the most part this may be one reason for the very competitive pricing of this unit.

The disadvantage of the TS-820 is probably the low output on 10 and sometimes 15 meters. The output on 10 meters is disappointing at about 70 watts, which is not sufficient to drive a linear using a pair of 3-500Z's. And speaking of Linears, Kenwood does have out a matching Linear, the Model TL-922A, which has a pair of 3-500Z's and is matched to the styling and appearance of the rest of the line. The drive power for their linear is 80 watts nominal and 120 watts peak, which is about what the TS-820 puts out over the 1.8 to 28.5MHz bands. Mods (american generated) are being talked up to raise the screen voltage on the 6146's to overcome shortcomings of low output and several others have surfaced, such as the Magicom RF Clipper which is said to be better for DX pileups than the built in RF Compression. Raising the screen voltage could tax the built in power supply (eventually resulting in a burned out plate transformer) and shortening the life of the 6146's. The duty cycle on SSB and CW is rather short except during tuneup (which has been known to be hard on 6146's) and so the above modifications might work perfectly well if one took it easy on the tuneups and was careful not to overwork the rig. An IF shift mod is also out, which is said to sharpen it up a little. A southern California ham also has cut a front end mod said to help the front end overload or cross modulation problems too. It is not bad to begin with but the latter mod is supposed to make an improvement.

To sum it all up, one would have to say that the TS-820S is a workhorse and that the pricing is right. There have been few complaints and not much talk of returns to the factory Service Office, all of which speaks well for this little rig.

With everything included for split operation (external VFO) the price is just over the \$1000.00 mark and that's about as good as you can get these days.

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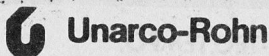
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
