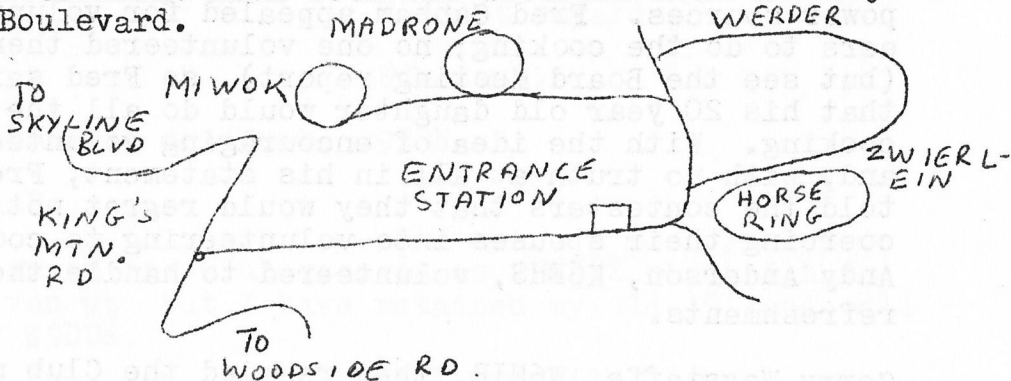


PRESIDENT'S CORNER:

CLUB MEETING & BOARD MEETING REPORTS: The Club meeting of June 4, 1982, was held in the Menlo Park Recreation Centre with a good crowd in attendance.

First, a report was given by the Post 599 members of their stand at a local High School. All went well except for their being placed next to a spark generator demonstration, which limited communication capability severely!

The next report was made by Jerry Starkey, WA6LIJ, concerning the Flea Market held at Foothill College on May 22. Like all Treasurers in similar circumstances, Gerry exuded happiness as he reported that the event had been a good financial success. This time, the Flea Market was held in the lower parking lots as lot T was being resurfaced; Gerry said that his only worry was that some of the older attendees might have a heart attack as they climbed the hill to the restrooms at the top!

Gerry Wagstaffe, W6NIR, then regaled the Club memb-

#### TRACING ONE'S ANCESTORS:

#### HEARING INJURY DUE TO RADIO:

From the April 1982 R.S.G.B. magazine, Radio Communication.

A legal case involving questions affecting all those whose job or hobby involves many hours of listening to weak signals half buried in noise was fought out recently in the High Court. It was successfully claimed on behalf of three radio intercept operators (and the widow of a fourth) that constant monitoring of radio signals had been the cause of their severe hearing impairments. All had worked for GCHQ (Composite Signals Organization) (British Army) for many years.

No one who has listened with headphones to the H.F. bands during periods of high static crashes would underestimate the effect on their ears. Some receivers, designed primarily to feed a watt or more of audio to a loudspeaker, can feed almost the same amount of power to a pair of headphones. The article suggested a pair of diodes as a limiter across one's headphones to prevent hearing injury.

As your Editor's threat to continue publishing his reminiscences unless other PAARA members submitted articles, has prompted no such articles, here is another installment. As readers of last month's issue know, your Editor grew up in the town of Newcastle, in County Down, in Northern Ireland.

Of the mountains behind the town, the best known is Slieve Donard, named after an early Irish saint or hermit who lived on the summit. The mountain rises from sea level to a height of 2796 feet and is the highest mountain in Northern Ireland. We used the summit as a 2 metre Field Day site, for one can see, to the East, the Isle of Man and the Scottish coast, and to the south, the Wicklow Mountains, south of Dublin, about 110 miles away. The air is crystal-clear, and the water in the streams is as pure as distilled water. Your Editor has climbed this mountain in almost every way possible, even at midnight on New Year's Eve, in waist deep snow, carrying a storm lantern!

Younger PAARA and Post 599 members who might wish to travel in Europe as cheaply as possible during this summer vacation, should be aware of the Youth Hostel movement, which can be joined in San Francisco. The Youth Hostels offer simple, inexpensive accommodation where bicycles, rucksacks, fishing tackle and climbing gear are not out-of-place. There are four such hostels in the Newcastle area: Kinnahalla (48 beds), Newcastle (48 beds), Slievenaman (20 beds) and Minerstown (22 beds). A sheet bag should be purchased at the San Francisco Youth Hostel H.Q. The Youth Hostel Association of Northern Ireland is at 56 Bradbury Place, Belfast BT7 1RU, tel. 0232 24733. The equivalent organization for the Republic of Ireland is An Oige, the address for which can be found in the Dublin telephone book, available in the Menlo Park and Palo Alto Libraries. If anyone goes, have a nice trip! Ed.



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
