A REPORT OF THE 1976 S.E.T.

from Steve K6FS. E.C. This year's SET occured Saturday January 24 between 10 AM and 4 PM in the Menlo Park-Redwood City Area. event's plan was to test communications in an emergency disaster relief plan developed jointly by the San Mateo Disaster Area and the Golden Gate Chapter of the Red Cross. The PAARA station, W60TX, served as net control station with K60TR over at the Red Cross building on Middlefield Road, as the alternate net control and administrative command post. Altogether eleven mobile teams were dispatched to sixteen sites previously set up by the Red Cross as critical to their operation. transmitting test messages back to NCS and Red Cross headquarters. During the exercise, 30 messages were handled, and signal, arrival, and assignment reports were exchanged between mobiles and NCS/ANCS.

Plans for this SET were drawn up by Steve, K6FS, ARRL/AREC emergency coodinator for Menlo Park, Redwood City, Woodside, Portola Valley areas. Pre-planning help was given by Pete Ashen, Disaster Officer, Golden Gate Chapter of the Red Cross, who gave a presentation to hams in Menlo Park January 13. In charge of operations at the PAARA trailer, W6OTX, was Fred K6YT, with assists from W6CUN and W6AIN who served as operators during the first half of the day, and by W6BFH and WA7DOX/6 during the latter part. Special help came from Jim, WB6ILZ, Fremont, in the form of a loan of a new FT-221 multimode 2-meter xcvr. K6OTR operations were run by Loren Chan. custodian of K6OTR, with help from Steve K6FS.

Each mobile reported by prearrangement to the Red Cross Hq on Niddlefield and was given a packet of material with a map of the area to be covered, a list of sites where they would be dispatched by NCS, and test messages which they would send from each site. Both before and after the exercise the teams were briefed on the procedures. All traffic was handled on two meters, both 145.24 AM and 147.45 FM. In addition W60TX listened on 3995 LSB for simulated earthquake advisories from Bob, K60L, who was independently mobile in the San Simulatingly continued next pg...

Andreas Fault area, Portola Valley. (Bob is a geophysicist with the US Geological Survey, Menlo Park, Specializing in techniques of earthquake prediction.)

Mobile teams operating during the SET were: WB6FFC, headed by Mike Bach, WB6JFH headed by Dave Harper, W6NIR headed by Gerry Wagstaffe, W6BFH headed by Bob Baum, WA7DOZ/6 headed by Terry Conboy, W6UOK headed by Glen Baker, WB4GIT/6 headed by Rob Shostak (also on 3995 LSB, WA6NCX headed by Rick Ferranti, W6AIN headed by Ed Fairbanks. Single-operator mobile units were Ve3FZK, Andy Korsak (also rather tenuously on 3995 LSB) and K6SEM, Bob Wheeler.

During the test period, a sample contact was made by K60TR with K6QFO via {R6AEZ repeater on 25/85, tying Red Cross HQ with the San Mateo County Emergency Op center in Redwood City. In addition, Dick, W6WVP in Portola Valley checked in and monitored 145.24 to

serve as a mobile to base relay if needed.

There was a good meeting with Pete Ashen on Feb. 10, with the result that participants who wished to receive Red Cross I.D. cards would do so. Also, plans were drawn up for a full disaster communications plan for South San Mateo County, involving support by PAARA through a network of mobile/portable/fixed ham rigs.

PAARA thanks all who participated -- this was good fun and as you can see, had some worthwhile spinoffs.

PROJECT STARQUEST de Mike Eccles G3PPE/W6
The search for intelligent life on the earth having so far produced no positive results, further attempts are to be made on the other star systems. To this end, following extraterrestrial intelligence searches such as project Ozma and Cyclops, a local group under the leadership of Nick Marshall, W60LO, has been formed over the past few months.

The first semi-formal meeting took place at Foothill College, February 17th, at which time we discussed general hard-ware problems. We also had the pleasure of a talk given by Barney Oliver of Hewlett-Packard and the

Project Cyclops program.

The big interest for hams is that the initial work will be devoted to optimising a receiving system (dish antena, low noise pre-amp, and narrow-band receiver) over the frequency range 1.4 to 1.7 GHz. As these frequencies are close to 1296 mHz, some work will be done simultaneously on 23 cm. In fact, the preliminary testing might include 23 cm moonbounce.

Dutch Abolish CB Service in the Netherlands after widespread abuses convince officials that cleanup is impractical.


All 27 MHz licenses have been revoked, and mobile vans have been shutting down illegal stations by marching in and confiscating equipment. It is very effective.

Legitimate business users of 27 mHz have been told to apply for business band licenses, while hobbiests are offered a no-code Amateur license, giving them 6 channels in the two-meter band. The Dutch Amateurs ricourously protested CB channels on 2 mtrs, and won. (HR Report)
