YOUR EDITOR-IN-CHEF wonders whether there are any other strange people who are interested in possible communications in the unlicensed band from 160 to 190 kHz. Part 15.112 of the FCC rules and regs allows operation in this frequency range with a transmitter input power of 1 whole watt input and an antenna plus feedline length of 15 meters (49.2 feet). The only other requirement is that emissions outside of this band be suppressed by at least 20dB. Apparently most of the work on this band is on 181.5 kHz. It would be very interesting to try the coherent CW techniques on this frequency and perhaps even try a bit of coherent-synchronous RTTY, possibly using PSK (phase shift keying) instead of the more common FSK, since PSK has a theoretical 3dB advantage. Three dB may not sound like much, but with the low power and the inefficient antennas permitted, it might make all of the difference in the world.

Direct conversion techniques would be very easy to implement for receivers and transmitters should be quite simple, too. Let your editorship know if you are equally out of your technical mind! 1976 OFFICERS--K6FS has agreed to be on the ballot as the presidential candidate. Still no one willing


to serve as secretary.

Repeater contacts do not count (except OSCAR) and a station can be counted only once, regardless of band or mode. Contacts must have been made between July 1 and December 31 of this year. Send \$1 and a list of stations, names, dates, times and modes to Club Secretary, SCCARA, P.O. Box 6, San Jose, CA 95103 to receive an award.
