LETTERS TO THE EDITOR:

"It's all relative when an object travels faster than light. From the <u>Smithsonian</u> magazine starting on page 132, November, 1976.

For the past several years theoretical physicists have been speculating about the existence of objects called "tachrons", "swift moving ones". If they exist they would have the property of moving faster than light. By contrast, all of the more mundane matter that we know about moves less than the speed of light and are called "tardyons"; "slow moving ones".

Most of us have heard that it is impossible for anything to move faster than the speed of light. This cosmic speed-limit is somehow imposed by Einstein's Theory of Relativity. Does this mean that scientists now believe that Einstein was wrong? Not at all. What emergence of the tachron idea means is that scientists have taken a closer look at the Theory of Relativity and have concluded that, under certain conditions faster than light travel is not forbidden.
