

Each of these ranked 4th in the nation so let's do our best to keep them in their class next year! EQUIPMENT CORNER: A continuation of "New Transciever Comparisons" by Bob Thompson, K6SSJ --

YAESU FT-901DM:- This rig has about every accessory you can imagine and most are built right into the box. Its final and the driver are tubes but that's the end of it. R-F Speech processing, an Audic peaking system for CW not to mention the built in Curtis keyer chip. A memory system for remembering a frequency you want to come back to. A built in dual VFO system via the memory technique above. You can operate split without an external VFO by simply pushing the right set of buttons. Keying the rig via mic or key will select the proper VFO for transmitting in the event you are split. Rejection tuning and variable IF passband tuning make working thru the QRM less of a problem than most other transcievers. It's a wonder just how much nicer it is when you can slice out the interfering signal. The tuning button allows you a full ten seconds to peak up the frive, plate tuning and load controls. Saves tubes you know! The rig is packed with nice features and from the locks of their latest ads there are a number of accessories available in addition, such as: Phone Patch/ Speaker unit; a scanning VFO, a Transverter for 6, 2 and 3/4 meters, and a beautiful antenna tuner should you be operating barefoot or on field day etc.

All in all the FT-901DM is one of the nicest rigs to come along in a Long time. It takes a little getting used to but it's bound to be a popular transceiver in the years to come. The built in power supply can handle the usual American and European voltages and frequencies and the rig can also be operated from a car battery for portable or mobile use aswell. This rig would also make a DXpeditioner as happy as a clam and it's all in one neat package. There must be some kdisadvantages but I was unable to come up with any so far. Weight might possibly be a small problem as it could slow you up a bit if you're doing the O. J. Simpson thing. It weighs 40 lbs. in round numbers..

Area Convention. Jerry Starkey-WA6LIJ has announced that he and his committee have just made contact with the Cabana Hyet House in Palo Alto for the purpose of establishing a time for the 1979 ARRL Convention. At the moment, the Committee is considering a date in October, but Jerry says that the actual date is still under discussion. We'll probably have a firm date for you by next month. EMERGENCY CORNER: Saturday, November 11, at the San Jose Red Cross Building, Ed Gribi, WB6IZF, Emergency Coordinator for the Santa Clara Valley Section, Pacific Division, ARRL, met with 25 EC's and assistant EC's from the entire section. This was the first all-SCV EC meeting in the three years that K6FS has been EC for the Menlo Park-Redwood City area. Ed is really pushing to get SCV hams e emergency minded. The meeting opened with a 20-minute presentation by Bob, K60L, earthquake-prediction specialist with the USGS. He emphasized that in the SCV, which lies almost entirely in a probable severe-damage region, commercial and public-service communication systems would be almost completely knocked out by a Richter 8.3 shake. Radio amateurs with portable/mobile rigs and emergency power would probably be the main first-response communications available during the initial 12 to 24 hours after that big a quake. Individual EC's reported past SET experience; Ed, WB6IZF, described plans for a high-level 2-meter repeater dedicated to SCV-wide emergency communication, to go on N6HM's Mt. Chual site in the near future. A possible section-wide SET was briefly discussed; plans to be firmed up soon. EC's will be contacting clubs in the SCV to secure formal agreements to help organize section-wide emergency communication capability; clubs participating will receive certifiof efficiation with ARES (Amateur Radio Emergency Service).

Desirability of portable repeaters was emphasized; example - IC-22's back-to-back, as whipped up during the Marble Cone fire of 1977.


