

EYEBALL CORNER: Tests done by a R. L. Carpenter on the eyes of rabbits showed that lens opacities (cataracts) could be induced after exposure to 180 milliwatts of microwave radiation per square centimeter. The Bureau of Radiological Health (Federal Agency) in their own tests, found that levels of 10 - 12 mW/cm² did not cause cataract formation—and no one knows; a) what level does cause cataracts in rabbits and b) what relationship exists between rabits and humans!






