

The first meeting of the New Year was well attended and several new faces, and several returning faces were seen and wel-

comed.

Unfortunately our mystery speaker remained a mystery, and yours truly was called upon to quarterback the second half of the meeting. After being 'sacked' several times we did end with some positive yardage and with several key plays having emerged.

(1) Approximately 99 percent of the attending membership was active in the preceeding two weeks on 160 thru 440 including 30 metres. No one attempted 1296 or above. (No SWL reports on 2.1 - 2.5 GHZ).

(2) Most of the membership would like talks

on antennas (starting with the basics).

(3) A public address system is needed so that yours truly and other speakers can be heard over the ORN and the unintentional jamming. W6AIN, Ed Fairbanks, donated a ten ton boat anchor, but I think that I'll pass it on ofr the auction. Any other suggestions/donations? (Ed.: Some Greek fellow practiced talking with a stone in his mouth by the sea-shore until he became an expert public speaker. You could try that!)

(4) We need (and we have started the ball rolling at the board meeting) to seek new blood in both Post 599 and Paara. Please pass along any ideas to K6EHS, Andy Anderson who will coordinate the effort.

(5) The fairly consistent late arrival of Paaragraphs to some QTH's is a problem (more

later).

Resolutions...we will have a speaker soon on HF, VHF/UHF antenna design, construction, and use. We need to halt a trend of declining paid-up membership. In 1982 we had 123 paid members. In 1983 we had 72 paid members, a 42% drop. This is my number one M.B. O. (management business opportunity); let's make it everyone's.

Addressing the Paaragraphs issue, KA6LZI, Bill McElhinney will be doing some experimenting on mailings, use of covers, and drop sites with this issue of Paaragraphs. Please dome to the next meeting bringing the date you received Paaragraphs, especially if you live in the 94025 zip area (where most

of the trouble seems to be).

The cost of Paaragraphs last year (before advertising revenue) was \$1175, or \$98 per issue. If you subtract about \$25 for mailing expense at the bulk rate, this leaves us with a net cost of \$73 per iisue. Toehave Paaragraphs professionally printed would cost an extra \$30 to \$40 per issue, an expense we cannot presently absorb. If anyone has any positive feedback, and I stress 'positive', please let me know.

CONTESTS! by Alan Larsen, WA6AZP

Novice Roundup: I hope that this issue gets to you avid readers in time for participation in the 1984 Novice Roundup. The contest lasts an entire week, with two weekends, but to keep contesters from killing themselves, the participants are limited to a maximum of 30 hours. The times are:

0001 January 28 (Saturday) 2359 February 5 (Sunday)

The contest is for Novice and Technician operators to exchange QSO's with as many stations as possible in the 3.5, 7, 21 and 28 MHZ Novice/Technician bands. Other operators work Novice and Technician stations only.

The required exchange is signal report and ARRL Section (or country for DX stations). Novices should sign /N and Technicians should sign /T after their callsigns so that others will know their licence class. To save time, the /N or /T may be dropped after the QSO is established.

For details of scoring or for any other questions, see the announcement on pages 79-

80 of the January QST, or call me.

COWW 160 metre Contest: This will give you a chance to show off your new rhombic antenna on 160. (Ed.: Be careful as you turn it!) Exchange signal report and serial number. Avoid the 1825-1830 DX window. North American Sprint:

CW: 0100 - 0459 UTC Feb. 5

Phone: 0100 - 0459 UTC Feb. 12.

I tried this one last fall. The CW part is a REAL KILLER! The phone part is fun, actually. These have a special QSY rule: stations soliciting a call by sending CQ, QRZ, etc., are permitted to work only one station in response to that solicitation. They must then move at least 1 KHZ before working any other station, or at least 5 KHZ before again soliciting calls.

This rule prevents one station from sitting on a frequency and working many stat-

ions in a row.







I have been feeling very well, and have


I have been feeling very well, and have had no major health problems, and I hope

# SPECS And Other News

Here are the changes made by the directors of SPECS on 1/14/84.

(1) QSTs pertaining to all amateurs and provided by Westlink will be broadcast on the SPECS repeater each Monday night at 7:50 pm local time. These broadcasts should start by January 23, 1984. This broadcast will run until 8:00pm when the regular weekly net will start.

(2) To shorten the time required in calling the roll the board agreed that the following procedure will be used. The EC or an alternate AEC will be directed to a simplex frequency for the roll call of his area. After the roll call all stations are requested to return to the repeater for directed calls and the general ragchew etc....

(3) Further it was agreed that south of Sunnyvale and north of Palo Alto ECs would

have difficulty reaching their members. The EC for Sunnyvale will use the 146.715 repeater, and the north of Palo Alto EC will use a repeater on 145.23 for roll call. (4) Simplex frequencies were assigned according to the State of California Emergency Radio Plan:

Palo Alto 145.020 simplex Mt. View 144.915 simplex Los Altos Hills 145.530 simplex 146.595 simplex

Stolen Yacht
Caught in the Net

Wireless World,
December 1983

When the 40ft ketch 'Frizelle' was stolen from Alicante it was reported to the local amateur radio maritime network. Such reports are repeated twice a day and the news spreads world-wide through various relay stations.

two weeks later, a member of the About network spotted a boat 'answering the description' of the Frizelle in Arrecife. Canary Islands. Registration and engineering serial numbers confirmed it to be the stolen yacht which was probably on its way to South America, where incidentally other sailing hams had already been alerted.

The nets are organised for the informal exchange of position, weather and harbour but some dramatic rescues have information been assisted by floating radio amateurs.

In the Round-the-World yacht race, French competitor, Jacques de Roux, sinking in the South Pacific. He pushed the 'panic button' on his satellite tracking transponder. The ham relay station in New-port, Rhode Island alerted the UK station who passed the information to their Zealand counterparts. The New Zealand station was in touch with Richard Broadhead, another competitor who was 300 miles away from de Roux. Richard got to Jacques when he had only four inches of freeboard left. The UK network was started in September 1969 by David Jolly, who provided the above inform-
