

Master of Morse code Don Joh

86-year-old ham radio instructor in SSF

SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO - When 86-year-old Don Johnson transmits over the amateur radio waves, everybody listens.

Or so it seems.

For more than 50 years, Johnson has been airing Morse code from his South San Francisco house to thousands of listeners worldwide and hundreds of students locally in his back room ham radio school.

"He's known all over the world. I hardly ever talk to a ham who doesn't know W6QIE." said Lee Savage of Millbrae, who was taught Morse code by Johnson in 1937.

Knowledge of Morse code, an alphabet of only dots and dashes that sound like dits and dans is required for amateur radio licensing under Federal Communications Commission rules.

Code, known as CW in ham radio circles, or phonetically as Chaney Whiskey, is burdensome for many to learn. But when local residents are preparing for an FCC test, they turn to John-son. His students' passing rate is quite successful.

"I think Don has become an institution." said Mike Henson. a salesman at Burlingame's Ham

Radio Outlet.

The store has a perfect solution for customers who are unsuccessful at learning Morse code through audio tapes or books.

"I send them over to Don's place. I do it all the time," Hen-

son said.

"As a matter of fact, we have his telephone number etched into our counter to refer people to him.

Johnson refuses to charge for teaching others his only hobby.

And Johnson can't think of anything he'd rather be doing. 'It keeps me busy. Otherwise I would be sitting there twiddling my thumbs.

Johnson retired from a 20vear-career with the U.S. Navy in 1943. "I've been retired a hell of a long time," he said while standing in a room containing 11 radios connected to nine antennas behind his house on Alta Vista Drive.

Johnson was a code teacher in the Navy, stationed aboard ships in the South Pacific or on Trea-

sure Island.

A few years before retiring from Treasure Island, he began a radio school for military personnel and civilians. But when he retired, he left the school, only to start it again, after receiving letters from listeners around the globe who missed his transmissions - listeners he didn't even know existed

He continued the on-the-air school and hasn't wanted to

"I just got started and I can't quit. I tried to help these guys get started and I got going on it. so I took another one or two and

it just got going,"Johnson said.
"I'm limited to how much I can do physically, so I can do this without much physical exertion so it works out pretty good," said the master of Morse code.

Johnson spends at least six hours each day preparing code tapes to air over three bands. He no longer uses a Morse code keyer. Instead, he records his programs by typing paragraphs out of ham radio journals and into a computer program.

Once entered, he can adjust the transmission speed from the 5 words per minute required to pass the FCC novice test, up to the 20 words per minute needed for the extra class license.

The lessons can be heard nightly at 8 o'clock on 3.590 MHz.

Johnson also teaches code in person, along with radio theory, in a large classroom he built. The class meets Tuesday and Thursday nights for two hours.

Three other groups also meet in the room equipped with dozens of headphones and several cassette players.

The North Peninsula Electronics Club holds meetings once a month: a Bay Area emer-

gency communications group gathers every three months; and volunteer test examiners administer FCC morse code tests

Johnson loves opening his doors to new and old students.

"He just has this incredible interest in even the new technology," said Henson of the Ham Radio Outlet. "I've gone down to his club several times, this guy is as interested in it as the young guys are. It's not just his drive to get people interested in the hobby, he's got his own internal drive, it's amazing.

Johnson, who doesn't mind a lifetime of hearing beeping dits and dahs, wants to keep teaching code as long as he can.

"Eventually I'll have to quit," he said. "I'm 86-years-old. I can't keep going forever.


His listeners, wherever they are, would certainly like him to.

MUSEUM WINS ANOTHER ROUND IN BATTLE WITH FOOTHILL COLLEGE BY JIM WELDON LOS ALTOS, AUGUST 19, 1990 -- THE PERHAM FOUNDATION, WHICH OPERATES THE DISTRICT'S MOTION. SHE SAID THAT THE PERHAM FOUNDATION'S COMPLAINT HAD BATTLE TO STAY OPEN DESPITE THE FOOTHILL COLLEGE'S EFFORTS TO SHUT IT FOUNDATION'S ORIGINAL PLEADINGS AND SCHEDULED A HEARING FOR SEPTEMBER ELECTRONICS MUSEUM AT FOOTHILL COLLEGE, HAS WON ANOTHER ROUND IN ITS DOWN. WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 15, THE FOOTHILL-DE ANZA COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT'S LAWYERS APPEARED IN NORTH COUNTY SUPERIOR COURT IN PALO ALTO FOR THE THIRD TIME. SANTA CLARA COUNTY SUPERIOR COURT JUSTICE 6 OF THIS YEAR, IS ON VACATION. THE DISTRICT'S LAWYERS PRESENTED A NORTHWAY TO CANCEL THE HEARING SCHEDULED BY JUDGE FOGEL AND THROW DIANE NORTHWAY PRESIDED. JUDGE JEREMY FOGEL, WHO HEARD THE PERHAM CASE OUT. AFTER ONLY A BRIEF HEARING, JUDGE NORTHWAY DENIED THE "MOTION FOR JUDGMENT ON THE PLEADINGS," IN EFFECT ASKING JUDGE SUFFICIENT MERIT TO BE HEARD.

HAVE MISSED THE FACT THAT MOST OF THE GALLERY WAS THERE TO SUPPORT ALTHOUGH SOME HAD TO LEAVE BEFORE THE CASE WAS HEARD, THE JUDGE COULD THERE WAS A GOOD TURNOUT OF RADIO AMATEURS, ANTIQUE RADIO COLLECTORS, AND OTHER FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM. NEARLY EVERY SEAT IN THE COURTROOM FILLED WHEN JUDGE NORTHWAY CONVENED THE COURT AT 9:40 A.M. PERHAM FOUNDATION'S CASE.

THAT THE MUSEUM BE ALLOWED TO REMAIN OPEN FOR BUSINESS AS USUAL UNTIL DISTRICT'S LAWYER CLAIMED THAT THE COLLEGE WAS LOSING INCOME THAT IT COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT'S LAWYER SAID SHE NEEDED TIME TO PREPARE INJUNCTION, EXTENDING THE MUSEUM'S RIGHT TO STAY OPEN, BECAUSE THE MUSEUM AT ITS JANUARY 22 MEETING. JUDGE FOGEL AT THAT TIME ORDERED THE PERHAM FOUNDATION FILED SUIT ON JANUARY 24, ALLEGING THAT THE FOR THE HEARING. THE PERHAM FOUNDATION WAS REQUIRED AT THAT TIME DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES WRONGFULLY ORDERED THE CLOSING OF THE POST A \$150,000.00 BOND. THIS WAS BECAUSE THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE A HEARING COULD BE SET. ON MARCH 'ITH HE ISSUED A PRELIMINARY COULD OBTAIN BY USING THE BUILDING. MEMBERS OF THE PERHAM FOUNDATION'S BOARD OF DIRECTORS PUT UP THE BOND. QUITE OPTIMISTIC ABOUT THE POTENTIAL OUTCOME OF THEIR SUIT, THEY HAVE COLLECTOR AND SPECIALIST IN PUBLIC-INTEREST ORGANIZATION LAW, AND ARE COMMUNITY COLLEGE IS HIGHLY UNLIKELY TO PROVIDE ANY SUPPORT WILLINGLY THEY HAVE RETAINED SAN FRANCISCO LAWYER BART LEE, AN ANTIQUE RADIO MOUNTED A CAMPAIGN TO RAISE FUNDS TO COVER THE NOT INCONSIDERABLE IN THE FUTURE.
