The 2009 Field Day results are in, and if you weren't at the last meeting or have not seen the results posted on the ARRL website or QST, PAARA was ranked 3rd place in the nation for 4A! The next closest California station in 4A was K6TS in the East Bay Division with fewer than



half the points of PAARA. Our neighbors at W6YX made the overall top ten list with over seventeen thousand points but in category 4F—must be nice!

W3AO came in with the top score — an amazing 30,888 points running 20A. Just thinking about the effort required to build up a 20 transmitter Field Day site gives me a headache. FIELD DAY RESULTS ARE IN!

Final results for the 2009 Field Day have been announced in the December issue of QST and on the ARRL website. The PAARA score (11,326 points from 3,480 Q's) has been confirmed as submitted and our national ranking improved for the fifth year in a row, jumping this year from fifth in the nation to third in the nation in our category! For the fourth year in a row, we are ranked in the top ten for stations in our category. See the table of our scores and national rankings.

This year we trailed only the Huntsville ARC station (14,404 points from 4,708 Q's) and the Utah DX Assn station (14,080 points from 4,624 Q's). This is an unusually good showing for the west, as two of the top three stations were west of the Mississippi. The east coast is generally thought to have an advantage in Field Day because of the larger number of nearby ARRL sections and stations to be worked on the east coast, as compared to the west coast.

It is interesting to note that our number of QSO's and total score have steadily increased for the last five years, in spite of the deteriorating propagation conditions over that same time period. Surely this reflects the increasing skill and perseverance of our operators, as well as a winning plan executed each year.

The 2009 total score of 11,326 is the third year in a row that we broke the 10,000 mark in points, which had not been done in any of the twenty years before that. But before we gloat too much, we should take a look at the October 1979 issue of QST which gives our results for the 1979 Field Day. That year we achieved a score of 12,582 from 4,284 QSO's and a national ranking for category 4A of Number One! Yes, thirty years ago we were number one in the nation, with over 800 more QSO's than we garnered this year. To have reached number one this year, we would have needed as many as 1,200 or more additional QSO's. So there is definitely room for improvement, which is what makes Field Day such a fun game. It is my understanding that our Field Day wizards are already hard at work, developing a plan for breaking 15,000 points in 2010. Mark your calendars now for June 26-27 in 2010!

PAARA/FARS Holiday Banquet

Our speaker for the 2010 Holiday Banquet will be **Professor Thomas H. Lee** of the Stanford Microwave Integrated Circuits Laboratory. He will speak on the early history of radio and its relationship to the development of Silicon Valley. His talk, entitled "From Arc Alley to Silicon Valley" was based in part on his book chapter entitled "A Nonlinear History of Radio."

Professor Lee has pictures of a Palo Alto home (at Channing Ave. and Emerson St.) that was the 1909 birthplace of the first high-tech company in what would later become Silicon Valley. He will provide an overview of the contributions to radio technology by pioneers such as Maxwell, Hertz, Marconi, de Forest, Fessenden, Herrold, Litton, Terman, Alexanderson, Poulsen, Elwell, Pridham, Jensen, Farnsworth, Heintz, Kaufman, Eitel, McCullough, Shockley, Kilby, Noyce, and Hoerni, just to name a few.

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Thomas H. Lee received the S.B., S.M. and Sc.D. degrees in electrical engineering, all from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1983, 1985, and 1990, respectively.

He joined Analog Devices in 1990 where he was primarily engaged in the design of high-speed clock recovery devices. In 1992, he joined Rambus Inc. in Mountain View, CA where he developed high-speed analog circuitry for 500 megabyte/s CMOS DRAMs.

He has also contributed to the development of PLLs in the StrongARM, Alpha and AMD K6/K7/K8 microprocessors. Since 1994, he has been a Professor of Electrical Engineering at Stanford University where his research focus has been on gigahertz-speed wireline and wireless integrated circuits built in conventional silicon technologies, particularly CMOS. He has twice received the "Best Paper" award at the International Solid-State Circuits Conference, co-authored a "Best Student Paper" at ISSCC, was awarded the Best Paper prize at CICC, and is a Packard Foundation Fellowship recipient.

Professor Lee is an IEEE Distinguished Lecturer of the Solid-State Circuits Society and has been a DL of the IEEE Microwave Society as well. He holds 43 U.S. patents and authored *The Design of CMOS Radio-Frequency Integrated Circuits* (now in its second edition), and *Planar Microwave Engineering*, both with Cambridge University Press. He is a co-author of four additional books on RF circuit design and also cofounded Matrix Semiconductor (acquired by Sandisk in 2006). He is the founder of ZeroG Wireless.

#### **ROCKBOUND** on the **ROCK**

According to Man Fai's letters, southwest China's high, rugged mountains were unfriendly and miserable; cold rain prevailed in the winter. Living conditions at the university were marginal—new, unfinished buildings of reinforced concrete, small rooms, unfamiliar food and accommodations. Incoming students were pitifully unprepared for higher education; library and study arrangements were rudimentary; counseling assignments were burdensome. Relationships with colleagues and administrative staff were frustrating; he was made to feel foreign despite his ethnic origins. In a word, academic life was not up to expectation. Black-and-white snapshots of his environment reflected his complaints - life *looked* grim indeed. It was an easy guess that he was one homesick islander.

Letters from XU7Y seemed a therapeutic safety-valve.

Early in the correspondence he described his travels from Ha Noi, his port of entry, to the heart of rugged, primitive Yunnan. His journey took many days from the seacoast by rail and by riverboat. At each boundary crossing—and there were several—his baggage containing books and equipment for his new profession, plus a collection of electronic components for a ham station, was opened, inspected, and, in some cases, generously pilfered.

By Spring 1937 Japan had invaded the north and was moving south. Man Fai's letters worried about his future at the university. (General Chenault's "Flying Tigers" were based in Yunnan Fu; the Burma Road had begun to take shape, the USS *Panay* had been "mistakenly" bombed, and the city of Nanking attacked and despoiled.). After a long silence, and no more XU7Y QSO's, the last letter arrived. It was posted literally as he boarded ship in Hong Kong for Honolulu. There was no further word from or about about Man Fai.

An era had come to its end.

Many years later, K6FS connected from time to time with KH6IJ, Katashi Nose, Honolulu. With longstanding ham friends in common—Bob Chapman, W1QV, "Mr. Ham Radio", New London, and Carl Smith, W0BWJ, ARRL interim President, Denver—there was

plenty to reminisce about. Nose, a professor of physics at U of H, had taken summer courses at Stanford in 1964 and had been guest of honor at Visalia DX conventions. Both Bob and Carl had visited Nose during business trips to Honolulu, Bob to SubPac at Pearl Harbor, Carl driving Western Airlines 707's SFO to HNL, and so forth. On the spur of recollection, XU7Y's story came up. Nose had known him—they'd graduated from U of H. in the same class. Man Fai had survived WWII, made a career in electronics with FAA, and was retired and enjoying life in a multigenerational family. He had *NOT* resumed interest in amateur radio. Nose hadn't been in touch, but his XYL could make discrete inquiry; as a professional health caregiver she was widely known and knowing. More notes were exchanged. The final word was simply that Man Fai was still around, but otherwise occupied. That was all.

The places and people of the late 1930's now survive mostly in our memories. The entire island of Corregidor is a memorial to its World War II history. It has become a tourist destination with scheduled boat service to and from Manila, overnight accommodations, food service, and thoughtful tours over old pathways. There is no trace of KA1US.

In January 1974 Steve Stuntz returned to ham radio as an Extra Class licensee after a 15-year hiatus. From 1936 to 1939, he served at several bases in the Philippines, including Corregidor, as Signal Corps transmitter technician and operator on the overseas CW circuits. In 1937 he held KA1US for a year following W7AOQ's return to the US. During WWII he participated in research on selecting and training radio ops for the armed forces. At Columbia Recording Studios, in the spring 1943, he planned and supervised production of recordings combining CW at a range of speeds with various types of QRM, used by Army and Navy for training operators. Holding degrees in applied experimental psychology, he conducted research in Navy and Air Force laboratories in New England from

Holding degrees in applied experimental psychology, he conducted research in Navy and Air Force laboratories in New England from 1949 until 1964. He moved to California in 1964 on invitation from Stanford Research Institute, retiring in 1978 from a career in speech and ergonomic research.

He is a life member of Palo Alto Amateur Radio Association and ARRL. At present he is compiling a history of the ICAO/ITU international spelling alphabet. Steve may be contacted at K6FS@arrl.net.




